

Introducing Akishima!

Akishima City was born from the merger of the town of Showa and the village of Haijima on May 1, 1954.

Following its municipalization, the city's industry flourished thanks to the influx of new businesses and the city increased its population as a bedroom community of Tokyo. While maintaining a natural environment with abundant groundwater and the greenery of Musashino, the city boasts a comfortable living environment about an hour away from heart of Tokyo.

- 1894 Ome Railway begins service; Haijima Station opens
- 1954 Akishima born as a city (population: 36,482)
- 1959 Showamae Station changes name to Akishima Station
- 1961 Discovery of nearly complete fossil of whale at Tama River
- 1987 City population exceeds 100,000
- 1993 Exchanges begin with current Friendship City of Iwaizumi in Iwate Prefecture
- 2016 New name "Mokusei no Mori" (Forest of Sweet Osmanthus) given to past site of Tachikawa Base



On the present JR Itsukaichi Line, there was once a leg between Tachikawa and Haijima. Opened at the start of the Showa period, it was closed after less than just 15 years. Now a road, it still shows traces of its railway past. Within the city are many names related to railways, such as Haijima Station Street and Gotetsu (Itsukaichi Railway) Street, and places where odd-appearing wide spots in roads near traces of train stations. You can enjoy a walk along these "unseen railways."



During the war, the Tamagawa-cho Hassei district was developed as a residential town for employees as military supply factories moved in from Nagoya. It was a major project, with about 500 homes, a rotary, major facilities including post office and kindergarten, and wellbeing facilities including a movie theater and public bath. Its name is derived from Seitaro Yokaichiya, who worked on the urban development. Even now, the eight streets branching out from the roundabout carry traces of the time.

The Shibasaki water diversion, a waterway that branches off of the Tamagawa Aqueduct, goes through Akishima and continues until Shibasaki-cho in Tachikawa. Walking this way from Matsunaka Bridge, you'll see some areas of pastoral scenery along the unlined waterway. The culvert continues for some time, making the stream hidden from view, but you can enjoy the developed water diversion along the way at Musashino Park. In the park is a hill with a fine view, as well as a rail monument to the Nakagami Side Track.
